Preschool

Young children are in a constant period of learning about themselves and their environment and it will be our privilege to guide them in this process. We have been very busy this past month and all the children have been adjusting very well to their new classrooms and routines. We started to learn new shapes, letters, numbers and we also introduced new vocabulary. The two year olds are learning shapes, colors, and important self-help skills. Our pre-primary class is enjoying the "I am a Mouse" lessons and the junior kindergarten class is working on the "Keep Running, Allen" lesson and started working in their letter books. Everyone is also enjoying their daily music lessons and weekly Spanish lessons. We are looking forward to a great school year and seeing the children grow and mature!

Kindergarten: Mrs. Metz

The Kindergarten classroom has been a busy place. The students are enjoying being together again in the classroom with their old friends and our two new friends Arya and Blake. The students are learning how to work independently at their desks and at the Teaching Table. The consonant letters and their sounds have been learned, along with the two vowel rule (generally the first vowel in a word says its name and the second vowel is silent) and how to read words with two vowels in them. The K students like their afternoon classes. We have Spanish with Ms. Garza, art with Ms. Ghonouie, yoga with Ms. Aileen. music with Ms. Murga and P.E. Classic children's literature is important in our classroom. The students have enjoyed "Jack and the Beanstalk", "The Three Billy Goats Gruff" and "The Little Engine That Could". In math, the students are learning to count from 0 to 100 and by tens to 100. The names of the flat and solid shapes have been learned, along with looking around us and naming the different shapes we see. They have noticed the poles around our school are called cylinders. For science, the students are learning about the four seasons, how apples grow and names of the different types of apples. Our class has a special event in October, the Kindergarten families are meeting at Tanaka Farms in Irvine. Each family will drive thru the farm in their own cars, and also thru the pumpkin patch and barnyard exhibit. The highlight of the day will be when we can pick out our pumpkins, grown at Tanaka Farms, to take home to enjoy for Halloween. I am grateful we are back at school. I wish everyone a wonderful fall season!

1st Grade: Ms. Vardeman

I am happy to welcome you to the 2020-2021 academic year. What a great start we have had. I look forward to a productive partnership to ensure the children will achieve their highest potential. First grade has been very busy learning about rules and laws in Social Studies, while applying them in their daily routine on campus and in the classroom. In Science, students learn about what it is to be a scientist. Our upcoming lessons will be focused on animals, garden planting and growing. Carden's reading program covers phonemic awareness, word skills, mental imagery for comprehension, vocabulary development, and rhythm and expression. The students actively participate in daily oral reading instruction. Carden math is designed to build a strong foundation and deep understanding of mathematical concepts. Children





acquire mathematical abilities manipulatively, visually, conceptually, and sequentially. The goal is to develop, practice, assess and master concepts incrementally. In the Preschool, the children will continue to explore the un-pitched rhythm instruments, developing rhythmic skills through music and movement, recognizing fast and slow, loud and soft, and high and low concepts of music. Kindergarten is learning to establish a steady beat by chanting the poem "Johnny Works with a Hammer". They are learning to clap and tap the steady beat on a drum, rhythm stick or an any rhythm instrument. The First, Second, Third and Fourth grades are learning the history of the song "Star Spangled Banner" by reading, listening and watching the story of the song, as well as memorizing and understanding the words of the song. This month, we are also revisiting the things we learned in Music Theory, as well as the Elements of Music, particularly rhythm and melody. Mr. Wilkinson

Welcome back to a new school year. September came and went so quickly, and we've already experienced historic fires while navigating a new normal for our teachers, students and parents. This has been at the very least, an unusual year. Thank you all for your continued support as we navigate through any bumps in the road that have or will come along in the near future. Parents should take comfort knowing that teachers are working hard and doing their best educating students through it all. I would like to thank parents for their continued support. The fifth grade students are learning what it's like to be in middle school. This includes a bigger workload than they experienced before and higher expectations. In science, we have started the year learning the scientific method and how to write a lab report using it as our guide. Students have also learned how to create and analyze graphs and data tables. Sixth grade students are off to a quick start to math this year. Much of the first few weeks of any new school year begins with a review of previously learned concepts. This helps students gain a solid foundation for further understanding of new concepts and standards. This past month the students have been reintroduced to variables, powers and exponents, decimals and place value, as well as products and quotients. I have seventh grade students for two classes: Life Science and math. In life science, we have started off the year learning about cells as the smallest unit of life. We are in the process of learning about the phases of mitosis and meiosis (cell division). In math, students are working out of Course 3 of the Glencoe series which focuses primarily on pre-algebra and algebra concepts. Among these concepts, students are learning that variables like being alone, to solve algebraic equations you always do the opposite, whatever you do one side of the equation, you do to the other, and growing up in the time of Covid is no fun at all. Over the summer, I had many of the eighth grade students in a summer school math class. We began working in our Algebra I book on the first three chapters. As we had new students begin this school year, we began with a review of Chapter 3 because it contains concepts that are vital for all students to understand in order to have a strong math foundation one needs to master Algebra I. In science, we started the year reviewing the scientific method and writing lab reports, creating and analyzing graphs and data tables. Students learned what a constant line should look like in a time/position (distance) graph and that Mr. Wilkinson has some weird fascination with graphing and analyzing data tables (and peanut butter).



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
